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The current <u>Bill C-63</u> (the Online Harms Bill) was introduced in the federal House of Commons February 26, 2024. It is described as a 'House Government Bill' sponsored by the Minister of Justice, <u>The Honourable Arif Virani</u>.

The first Liberal government effort to deal with online harms occurred with their 2021 Bill C-36.
